Question: What are facets of democracy nowadays?

- too big gap between the political class and normal people
- lack of European identity (low interest)
- lack of information
- lack of "brains" (people that have to vote)
- democracy only on the national level in the EU
- lack of representation and accountability
- bureaucracy
- national interest above the European interest
- not efficient decision-making process (leaders do not dare to take unpopular decisions)
- too much connection between business life and politics
- manipulation of the image of the EU
- manipulation of information
- lack of active citizenship

- people choose the picture of politicians (a mask they wear)
- people are not rational actors
- too low interest in the content of political campaigns
- no clear decision if money or population should matter (what should decide about the amount of votes that countries have in the EU)
- lack of essential (political and human) rights
- mysterious link between media and politicians
- corruption
- different levels of development in different cultures
- democracy tends not to be sustainable
- politicians and people want to profit in a short term
- different efficiency of different democratic structures
- lack of power of minority groups

Question: What are advantages of centralized and decentralized system?
